Prairie Energy linemen assist with derecho power restoration

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The derecho that tore through Iowa in August left thousands of people without power and caused hundreds of millions of dollars in damage. More than 2,000 cooperative power poles were broken statewide. At the height of the outage event, more than 60,000 cooperative member accounts were without power. Within 72 hours, two-thirds of those accounts were restored.

More than 20 co-ops from across the region assisted with restoration efforts in a demonstration of the sixth cooperative principle: cooperation among cooperatives, with Prairie Energy being no exception.

Nine of our linemen assisted in restoration calls for help from other cooperatives, as well as Alliant Energy: Austin Codner, Nick Dennler, Jared Hannasch, Wes Held, Matt McDermott, Scott Muhlenbruch, Dylan Ptacek, Kevin Rotschafer, and Andrew Stupka.

Increasing your brain power: Fun energy facts

Although Americans account for 4.25 percent of the world's population, we use at least 17 percent of the world's energy. Here are some other energy facts:

- Heating and cooling accounts for about half of the average utility bill.
- Find (and fix) sources of air leaks in your home and replace inefficient windows, especially single-paned windows.
- Lighting accounts for approximately 10 percent of home utility bills. Like your parents always said, don't light an empty room. Also, put high-efficiency (LED) light bulbs to work for you.
- The typical U.S. family spends \$2,200 or more on home utility bills each year.
- If you have an electric or gas furnace, using a smart or programmable thermostat to adjust your thermostat 10 degrees for 8 hours a day could lower your heating and cooling costs by 10 percent per year. (Don't heat and cool an empty house.)
- Despite previously being touted as energy saving, closing vents in unused rooms can put a strain on your HVAC system, which typically uses more energy, not less.

Make your decorations the only scary thing this Halloween

Halloween has become a time to light up electric-powered decorations and create a yard that is scare-worthy to any trick-or-treater that may stop by. But beware of the hidden electrical dangers that could spoil your holiday.



Follow these tips to make your Halloween safe and fun:

- Carefully check your decorations for cracking, fraying, or bare wires.
- Replace any damaged decorations.
- Make sure all electrical outdoor products are Underwriters Laboratory (UL) approved and marked for outdoor use.
- Follow the care and instructions that accompany your decorations.
- Don't overload extension cords or allow them to run through water.
- Plug outdoor electric lights and decorations into outlets protected by ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs). If your outlets don't have them, either contact a qualified electrician to install them or use portable GFCIs.
- Keep electrical cords out of walkways to avoid tripping hazards.
- Turn off all electrical decorations and lights before leaving home or going to sleep. Consider using a timer.
- When decorating outside, always look up and check that you and any equipment, such as ladders, are at least 10 feet away from overhead power lines.

Avoid any tricks this Halloween by safely enjoying the holiday.



Prairie Energy recognized with Impact Award

Annually, the Iowa Area Development Group (IADG) presents Impact Awards to utility partners who have been involved in significant economic development initiatives.

Prairie Energy was recently presented with an IADG Impact Award for business and community development during the August board meeting. Recent examples of project support include securing funding through the USDA to support the \$7.4 million renovation project allowing Hancock County Health Systems to relocate and expand their surgical services, expand the emergency department, and update their main entry.

The co-op was also involved in talks with ReNewTrient 1 for three years, leading up to the decision to locate the new \$25 million organic fertilizer plant in Wright County.

"We commend Prairie Energy Cooperative for being an active supporter of business and community development in the territory they serve," said IADG President Rand Fisher. "They provide essential financial and technical

assistance that many times is a critical component in successfully securing projects that create jobs and support community vitality."

IADG was established in 1985 to promote and strengthen rural Iowa development opportunities. The IADG is the marketing and business development office for Iowa's member-

owned rural electric cooperatives, select municipal electric utilities, and independent telecommunication companies. IADG has assisted with over 2,100 successful business expansions and start-up projects. This growth represents capital investment of more than \$12 billion and 53,000 jobs for Iowa.



Fresh Apple Bundt Cake

4 cups apples, finely diced 2 cups sugar 1 cup nuts, chopped 3 cups flour ½ teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons soda 1 cup vegetable oil 1 teaspoon vanilla 2 eggs, well beaten

Mix apples and sugar, then let stand 1 hour to make its own juice. After 1 hour, add nuts and dry ingredients to apples. Add oil, vanilla, and eggs. Stir by hand, do not use a mixer. Pour batter into floured Bundt pan. It will be thick like fruitcake batter. Bake at 325 degrees F for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Serves 15.
